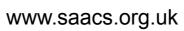
Spalding Arts & Crafts Society





The society is proud to be one of the oldest art societies in the country. The first records show that the society was formed in 1916 and meetings were held at the Johnson Hospital. It is popularly believed that the society was set up as therapy for servicemen wounded in the First World War. Spalding Town Council sponsored it's first exhibition in 1918.

One or two exhibitions have been held every year since then along with other displays at a variety of venues. In 1930 the Society was invited to hold it's annual exhibition at Ayscoughfee Hall - a tradition that continues to this day.

The present day society is still thriving. Members exhibit their work in local & national exhibitions & galleries.

We are a friendly group of local artists and are always ready to welcome new members whether you are a professional artist or a total beginner looking for help & inspiration.
