## Ayscoughfee Hall - Behind the scenes by Maggie Goodsell

At a recent networking meeting set up by our accountants at Ayscoughfee Hall, we were given the chance of a brief tour of the unseen parts of the Hall. Our guide was Julia Knight, manager of the hall.

After a talk about the history of the Hall and it's many owners the tour started in the mediaeval cellar, normally only seen through a cobwebby window. We then went up a steep stone spiral staircase, up a couple of short but steep wooden stairways and into the roof spaces. The second of these being the original roof space of the Great Hall, now the reception area & Gallery with an ornate Georgian ceiling obscuring the decorated roof timbers.

Sadly we weren't allowed into the third space as it is inhabited by bats. In summary, a fascinating glimpse 'behind the scenes'.

#### Try Something New by Lorraine Swepson

For the very first time I have taken part in the Peterborough Artists' Open Studios. I haven't done anything like this before but when asked if I would like to join with another artist and display my work at Black Cab Studios in Deeping St James I thought why not? It was a chance for a new experience and also promoted the art scene in the south of Lincolnshire.

We were visited by other artists as well as members of the public interested in art. Discussions ensued about the merits of opening your studio and the general consensus was that artists and visitors preferred the venue to be somewhere neutral as it was felt less intrusive on the artist's home life.

The Peterborough Artists' Open Studios is a well supported organisation with a very proactive committee offering a good support network so a newcomer like myself didn't feel left out on a limb.

I was very fortunate having such pleasant and interesting companions for the two week-ends we were open and time passed quite quickly. I was teamed with Elaine Anderson, a local artist from Langtoft, and Michelle Allot who owns the Black Cab Studio and carries out all the framing. We received many complements on the display and the work on show. Two more artists, Ellie Sandall and Lynn Booker, were open across the road so it made it a worthwhile trip to come to our neck of the woods!

The event was well advertised by the committee, local magazine produced by Judy Stevens, and artists circulating booklets and posters throughout the Peterborough area.


